Influencing to benefit members

In 2024/25, our members want to see us continuing to **ensure national commitment to ICSs** from political stakeholders as well as wider health and social care system partners, in a crucial year with the coming general election.

Delivering improvement impact

We will also continue to **share good practice and support implementation** to help ICSs achieve their four stated purposes of:

- 1. Improving population health and healthcare
- 2. Tackling unequal outcomes and access
- 3. Enhancing productivity and value for money
- 4. Helping the NHS to support broader social and economic development

To ensure our work is focused and driven towards member need, and can be measured throughout the year, we have identified **influencing** and **improvement** objectives for each purpose – these are consistent with our 2023/24 strategy.
